

If you lose power, check the fuse box which is housed underneath the bed in the right-hand cupboard. If you require any assistance, please contact us.

Please take care when walking round the grounds and gardens during your stay. Some of the ground can be uneven especially when the badgers have been out digging!

The garden paths can also be uneven in parts due to their age, we check these regularly for repairs but if you do spot anything dangerous please let us know.

The duck pond, hen's area and sheep enclosures all have live electric fences to protect them.

When driving around the countryside please do so with caution as we have regular horse riders passing through the area.

HEATING


The Wriggly Tin is insulated with real sheep wool which keep you cosy even on a cold day! The heating is provided by the wood burning stove and the heated towel rail in the bathroom. 

HOT TUB


Please ensure when using the hot tub fire, you use the heat protective glove provided for opening and closing the lid and placing extra logs in the fire. The fire section and chimney can get extremely hot and must not be touched. You must only use wood provided, do not buy your own fuel or burn anything in the wood burner other than the wood and fire lighters provided. Please read the below instructions carefully to ensure an enjoyable experience!




1. First of all - fill the tub with water. Fill it at least 2 inches / 5cm above the circulation pipes or a few inches below the inner stove pipe.
Always have water in the tub when there is a fire or glowing embers in the stove.




2. Place three fire lighters in the bottom of the stove, as close to the circulation pipes as possible. Carefully light the fire lighters. Let the fire lighters fully catch before adding some kindling. The arrows show the flow of air through the stove.



3. Add small logs and kindling horizontally in the stove. Put the big logs to the sides and the smaller ones/kindling in the middle. Add another fire lighter close to the burn plate.
The flames should always escape the stove through the chimney pipe, not the stove opening.



4. When the fire is going, fill the stove with logs, as the picture shows. Add logs every 20 minutes or so. Keep a strong fire in the stove. Close the stove lid completely when the water has reached a pleasant temperature.



5. If the water gets cold - adjust the hatch to allow for more draught, but no more than the picture shows.
You can also put more logs on the fire during a bath.


The hot tub will take about an hour to heat up, so pour yourself and drink and relax but keep an eye on the fire to ensure its stays strong.



6. Again, never leave the hatch off the stove, since this may result in flames escaping the stove and scorching the wooden frame of the tub, or parts of the interior.



7. Do not fill the stove with too much wood and make sure that the draught doesn't run the wrong way, making the flames escape through the stove opening.



8. And lastly - make sure that the fire and embers have died out completely before emptying the tub, otherwise the stove might warp from the heat.

Security lights are in the parking area with an external light on The Wiggly Tin (operated from the switch inside the door). There are also tree lights above the hot tub and a rechargeable torch for your use.

THE HISTORY OF TREGOOSE OLD MILL



There has been a water mill at Tregoose since the late 1400's with the current building dating back to 1750. It stands on the site of an old monastery which befell the anger of Henry VIII during the reformation. The original altar stone can still be seen in the garden and the stone that was used to build the mill is reportedly from the original Monastery. Tregoose Mill has witnessed many happy and some not so happy stories and tales from previous owners and occupiers.

Samuel Sweet was a very well-known horse trainer in the south west of England and occupied Tregoose in early 1900's. He died at Tregoose in 1907 aged 39 after falling from his horse at the ford. The Horse arrived back at the house rider less.

Between 1914 and 1918 German prisoners of war were put to work on the land here. The land at Tregoose currently grows Asparagus, Strawberries, Raspberries, Wild Garlic, Gooseberry's, Rhubarb and our orchards provide us with various types of Apples, Pears and Cherries.

Tregoose Mill ceased operation as a working flour mill in the 1920's. The original waterwheel was destroyed when a group of local boys re opened the mill leat which then washed away the decaying wood structure leaving only the original mill wheel spindle which can still be seen on the lower side of the building.

Karen Chandler and her family have been the longest owners of the Mill and such was Karen's love of the mill she wrote a detailed history and sketched several illustrations, a few of which can be found on pages 17-19.

In 1954 a scheme to flood Tregoose to create a reservoir was revealed and the Chandler family fought hard to protest these plans. Their determination was rewarded in 1956 when it was announced that the reservoir would now be created further downstream at Nanswhyden where it stands today.

One of the most colourful characters that has owned Tregoose Old Mill was Sue Cameron. It's fair to say that Sue loved the place which was sadly repossessed from her even though she had created a thriving Bed and Breakfast, Restaurant and Bar in the mid 1980's. The old menus from this time are on pages 15 and 16 along with articles and reviews that remind us of a simpler time when Ogden Melon was on trend in catering. One thing for sure is that Sue loved Tregoose Old Mill and spent many years nurturing the gardens and internal decoration rediscovering many original features. Sue's poem further on into the folder is testament to her love of the Old Mill.

For many years local boys have caught brown trout that live in the Porth river which runs along our land. Tregoose enjoys many different types of birds and wild animals. Woodpecker, Kingfisher, Swallow, Robin, Blackbirds and birds of prey can be seen in the sky. We have been fortunate enough to see Deer in the river and of plenty of badgers and moles.

Stephen and Dean Clayton-Madge are the current owners and feel honoured to be part of the next stage of the mill's history. The Hideaway is unrecognisable now and photos later in the folder stand testament to its recent transformation. Our desire has been to provide luxury country coastal living in surroundings that invite you to relax, enjoy time and forget your phones for a while.

Sue owned Tregoose Old Mill between 1984 and 1987 as Guest House, Restaurant and Bar and ran the place single handed. She was renowned for great food, hospitality and an honesty bar!

In our questionnaire we invite hoteliers to tell us of any special features their establishments offer. Sue Cameron, who owns this 15th-century mill guesthouse five miles inland from Newquay, writes: 'Dining room open to midday for those who want to sleep in late and have brunch as opposed to breakfast. Guests tell me at what time they wish to dine. I fit in with them, they don't fit in with me. They can come and go all day, and help themselves to tea and coffee if there is no one around.' If only all hotels would offer such facilities - and B&B in the £12 range . . .

Here is the report which drew our attention to this unusual set-up: 'As a "townie", I always feel that the really choice locations are the jealously guarded exclusive properties of the owners. One such is *Tregoose Old Mill*, but "foreigners" are actually welcome. It's a one-woman band - namely Sue Cameron, who's a refugee from London. The aim is to please; the accommodation is comfortable and the food good, from simple roasts to mid-ambitious Cordon Bleu. You eat at a communal dining table. Half the Mill's grounds are woodland, and there's a large orchard (guests may pick apples), with nearly a mile of fishing rights on the River Porth. The whole house has been decorated and refurbished with due attention to its 15th-century origins. The odd antique and knick-knack are relevantly scattered around and add to the general relaxed feeling of welcome. That attention to detail extends to the bedrooms - there was a pack of cards and Scrabble as well as fresh fruit and flowers, and those acceptable 20th-century conveniences like hair dryer, tissues, even a vacuum of iced water. The phone rang one morning when Sue was out feeding the goats, so I answered it - it's that kind of establishment. A local, mistaking me for the owner, thanked me for the meal she and her husband had enjoyed the previous weekend, and was phoning to reserve a table for five.' (Gillian Best)



The first reference to Tregoose as a mill, was recorded in 1492. There has, however, been a building on the site since the 9th century and today the beautiful old mill, set in its own grounds of some seven acres, with: goats, sheep, geese, chickens and an orchard – from which our guests can pick their own apples.

Tregoose is only five miles from Newquay; close to golden beaches, golf courses, riding stables, country clubs and excellent dining establishments. Within a short distance is Bodmin Moor and many other places of interest. There is trout fishing on the nearby Porth Reservoir, and, for the enthusiast, varied sea and shark fishing on both the north and south coasts.

The Mill owns nearly a mile of fishing on the Porth; brown and rainbow trout are available during the season.

Take a stroll by the river Porth and through the woods . . . Perhaps enjoy the magnificent panoramic view from Nanswhyden . . . On your return take the sun in the Italian garden or relax in the comfortable lounge with its inglenook fireplace – complete with the original baking oven.

The beamed dining room – which is the oldest part of Tregoose – will provide you with a comfortable atmosphere in which to enjoy your meals.

The altar stone in the garden at Tregoose Old Mill can still be seen today, it dates from the monastery that once stood here before the mill was built.


